

with Jim Draeger, Wisconsin Historical Society

The year is 1924. Football fever is sweeping America. There were three products of Green Bay on the most famous team in the nation, Notre Dame. Jim Crowley, one of the Four Horsemen, along with Red Hearden and Os Geniesse, all halfbacks from Green Bay East High, would lead Notre Dame on to win the Rose Bowl against Stanford. Crowley went on to have an active football career, including coaching at Fordham University when Vince Lombardi was one of the "Seven Blocks of Granite".



ROADSIDE GEOLOGY OF WISCONSIN

with John Luczaj, Ph.D., University of Wisconsin - Green Bay Have you ever wondered what makes Wisconsin's geology special? We will tour Wisconsin's geological history, which includes 2-billion-year-old mountain belts, 1-billion-year-old continental rifting, 400-500 million year old tropical seas, and 2 million years of glaciation.

Dr. John Luczaj is Chair of the Geoscience and Water Science disciplines in the Department of Natural and Applied Sciences at UW-Green Bay. Prof. Luczaj holds a B.S. in Geology from UW-Oshkosh, an M.S. in Geology from the University of Kansas and a Ph.D. in Geology from Johns Hopkins University. He has been a faculty member at UW-Green Bay since 2005.

INDIAN NATIONS OF WISCONSIN: VISION FOR THE FUTURE

with Patty Loew, Ph.D.

Ever wonder how a historian begins a project? Ojibwe author Patty Loew shares preliminary research for the 3rd edition of her award-winning book, Indian Nations of Wisconsin: Histories of Endurance and Renewal. As in her previous work, Loew uses an Indigenous framework, gathering oral history and reconstructing the past in collaboration with tribal elders, educators, and culture keepers while relying upon sources that are Native and often not print-based.

Patty Loew, Ph.D., is an enrolled citizen of the Mashkiibiizii (Bad River Band) of Lake Superior Ojibwe. She has most recently served as a professor at the Medill School of Journalism and director of the Center for Native American and Indigenous Research at Northwestern University. Previously, Loew was a professor at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

THE GREEN BAY AREA DURING THE BLACK HAWK **WAR OF 1832**

with Patrick Jung, Ph.D.

The Green Bay area was well outside the main theater of combat during the Black Hawk War of 1832. Nevertheless, as the war unfolded, local militia companies were organized in case the war spread to the Green Bay area. This talk will provide a general overview of the Black Hawk War, events in Green Bay during the summer of 1832 when the war was fought, and details about the Menominee Indians and their participation in the conflict.

Dr. Patrick J. Jung, received his doctoral degree in United States History from Marquette University in 1997 and has taught at the Milwaukee School of Engineering since 2003. He has authored two books and several articles on the Black Hawk War of 1832 and other Native-White military conflicts in the western Great Lakes region.
